Happy New Year from The Nippon Foundation. Although not officially beginning until the Lunar New Year next month, 2021 is the Year of the Ox under the Chinese zodiac cycle represented by 12 animals, which is also used in Japan. The ox is seen as having the positive characteristics of being hard-working, honest, and loyal. It is also associated with Sugawara no Michizane, a leading poet and scholar in ninth century Japan. He was born in 845, the Year of the Ox, and was known for being fond of using oxen for transport, including when he fell out of favor with the imperial court and was exiled from the capital. According to legend, the ox carrying his remains in his funeral procession stopped at a certain point and refused to move further. This was taken as a sign, and he was buried at that spot and a shrine built in his honor. After his death, a series of disasters struck the capital, and these were seen as his vengeance for having been exiled. To pacify his spirit, Michizane was deified as Tenjin, the god of scholarship, and today Tenman-gu shrines honoring Tenjin can be found across Japan.

With the new coronavirus crisis accelerating the use of digital technologies, the 32nd installment of the Awareness Survey of 18-Year-Olds was carried out on the subject of "Digitalization." Opinions regarding Japan's pace of digitalization were divided, with roughly 38% calling it "lagging" and roughly 31% saying that it was not. More than 60% of respondents considered government efforts to promote digitalization as "necessary," while less than 6% felt they were "not necessary."

Christmas ceremony held to mark distribution to roughly 100 locations nationwide



2nd Awareness Survey of 10,000 Women

The survey found that more than 60% of respondents consider the percentage of female legislators in the national Diet and prefectural assemblies in Japan to be "too low" and "needs to be increased."
