[The Nippon Foundation News] Tokyo Paralympics Mark Successful Conclusion

Greetings from The Nippon Foundation. After a one-year delay, the Tokyo Paralympic Games closed on September 5. Under an official motto of "United by Emotion," roughly 4,400 athletes from 162 countries and regions competed in more than 500 events in 22 sports over 12 days. The Nippon Foundation has been working to help make the Paralympic Games a success in a variety of ways, including through The Nippon Foundation Paralympic Support Center and The Nippon Foundation Para Arena, The Nippon Foundation Volunteer Support Center, and support for the I'mPOSSIBLE educational program developed by the International Paralympic Committee's Agitos Foundation.

As with the Olympic Games, athletes, officials, and the media were mostly isolated from the general public and most events were held without spectators to prevent the spread of coronavirus infections. The Paralympics received extensive media coverage, however, with a projected cumulative global television audience of 4.25 billion people. By highlighting the athletic performances of these elite competitors, the Games showed the world the significance of "unity and diversity."


'Buri' Yellowtail Invigorating Hakodate's Food Culture

Hakodate Buri Tare-Katsu (Hakodate Yellowtail Sauce Cutlet)



Hakodate, a city located near the southern tip of Japan's northern main island of Hokkaido, is known for its delicious seafood. Although not traditionally one of the region's popular fish varieties, warming ocean waters have led to a large increase in local catches of *buri* (yellowtail or Japanese amberjack). The *Umi-to-Nippon* Project is working to popularize buri as a menu item both in homes and in restaurants, especially when prepared as *buri tare-katsu* – a fried buri cutlet served with a special sauce.

The 40th installment of the Awareness Survey of 18-Year-Olds was carried out from July 16 to 20 on the subject of "Coronavirus Vaccines." The survey found that close to 40% of respondents wanted to be vaccinated but had been unable to make an appointment, as well as deep-rooted concern about side effects and an aversion to injections. Respondents rated essential workers in medical and social welfare facilities and public transportation highest in terms of vaccine priority, and also gave their opinions on domestic vaccine passports.
