Greetings from The Nippon Foundation. In Tokyo, the autumn leaves have now mostly fallen from the trees and winter weather has arrived. As with ume (Japanese plum) and sakura cherry blossoms in springtime, momiji (Japanese maple) viewing is popular in the late autumn, when the leaves turn various shades of red and orange before falling to the ground. Inokashira Park in Tokyo's western suburbs is a popular place to visit for both its sakura blossoms in the spring and momiji foliage in the fall. The park encompasses a large pond, which is the source of the Kanda River that flows eastward through the city and into Tokyo Bay, as well as a zoo, and a shrine dedicated to the goddess Benzaiten. The grounds of the Imperial Palace in central Tokyo are another large green urban oasis. Although mostly closed to the public, a section along Inui Street is opened twice a year to allow people to enjoy its sakura blossoms in the spring and momiji in the fall. This year, the street was opened to the public for nine days from late November through early December, for the first time in three years after having remained closed as a coronavirus prevention measure. On the first day, 50 people were already waiting at the gate by the time the street opened.



Presentations on joint research and development with DeepStar and Scottish Enterprise

## Removing 1.2 Tons of Debris from Beach on Remote Island

Demonstration uses landing craft, special vehicles, and volume reduction equipment



The Nippon Foundation, Hiroshima Prefecture, and Otake City held a joint demonstration project on November 17 on Atata Island for the efficient recovery and processing of large amounts of debris that have washed up on a remote island that is difficult to access, as part of their efforts to reduce plastic ocean debris. Using a landing craft, special vehicles for transporting materials and cleaning beaches, and plastic volume reduction equipment, roughly 1.2 tons of debris was removed from a 350-meter section of Nagaura Beach.
