Greetings from The Nippon Foundation. In late January many parts of Japan experienced "once-in-10-years" cold weather, accompanied by heavy snowfall in some parts of the country. Although Tokyo was spared the snow, several nights were cold enough that people were warned that water in the pipes to their homes could freeze overnight, and were urged to take preventive measures depending on where they live. Temperatures over the past few days have returned to normal or even slightly higher, but are set to fall again with a possibility of snow in Tokyo on Friday, followed by mild days over the weekend. Even though February 4 was *risshun*, the first day of spring in Japan's traditional lunisolar calendar, we can expect a few more weeks of alternating cold and warmer weather, with the warmer periods gradually becoming longer, before it actually begins to feel like spring.

14th facility of The Nippon Foundation's THE TOKYO TOILET project




The Nippon Foundation's THE TOKYO TOILET project is recreating public toilets in 17 locations in Shibuya, Tokyo, to make them accessible to

Results of 52st installment announced



The 52nd installment of the Awareness Survey of 18-Year-Oldswas carried out in early December on the subject of "Values and Life Design." While more than 40% of male and female respondents replied that they want to marry, only roughly 20% of men and roughly 10% of women replied that they believed they actually would get married. More than 70% approved of common-law marriages, the use of separate surnames by husbands and wives, and partnership oath systems for same-sex couples.
