Projects in Myanmar

The Nippon Foundation (TNF) has been supporting and implementing projects in Myanmar since 1976.

Initial projects were concerned with development of human resources and treatment of leprosy patients through the distribution of medicine. Over time we have expanded our activities across a wide range of fields.

Our current activities include support in health, education, human resource development, support for people with disabilities, and support to conflict-affected communities.

● Peace Building

The framework of this effort has three pillars:

- ① Building trust between the government and ethnic armed organizations;
- ② Providing support to conflict-affected people;
- ③ Promoting understanding of civilian control of the government.

● Human Resources Development

We support professional training for conflict-affected people, enabling them to find opportunities for employment and thus earn a stable income.

● Health

We aim to improve health care services through social welfare vehicles and training for prosthetists and orthotists.

● Education

We implement school construction projects conducted in cooperation with local residents in ways that promote community development, focusing on border areas where education infrastructure lags behind.

● Agriculture

We strive to increase farmers' income and enhance community development by helping farmers to obtain new skills, including ways to ship their produce to businesses.

● Support for People with Disabilities

We provide support for people with disabilities, promoting their independence through empowerment programs and by expanding the scope of opportunity for employment.

Humanitarian Support for Conflict-affected Communities

In consultation with Union and State governments and Ethnic Armed Organizations (EAOs), relief items including food, medicine, mosquito nets and solar lanterns were distributed to over 1 million people living in conflict affected communities in the areas controlled or influenced by EAOs.

Moreover, The Nippon Foundation supports Myanmar's peace process by promoting trust building between the Myanmar government and EAOs.

Donation of Construction Machinery and Flood Disaster Support for Conflict Affected People

In EAO-influenced areas in Mon state of Southeastern Myanmar, The Nippon Foundation donated construction machinery to conflict affected people, for the improvement of infrastructure. Further, in August 2019, those areas were severely damaged by floods and landslides. The Nippon Foundation covered the cost of fuel required to use the donated machinery to reconstruct the destroyed roads and bridges. The aim of this work was the resettlement of IDPs and refugees, and the stabilization of their everyday lives.

Providing Health and Medical Services to IDPs in Myanmar and Refugees on the Thai-Myanmar Border

Support is provided to the Mae Tao Clinic, which offers free health and medical services targeting IDPs in Myanmar and refugees on the Thai-Myanmar border. Project activities include improvement of nutritional conditions for inpatients, education on nutrition and hygiene for parents of malnourished children, provision of medical supplies, and the training of clinic staff.

This project provided vocational training in spinning and papermaking as well as marketing seminars to Myanmar refugees in Thailand. The objective of this project was to enable Myanmar refugees in Thailand to acquire vocational skills, and thus earn a stable income, both in Thailand as well as after returning to Myanmar in the future.

Tourism Development Project for Returnees Residing in Karen (Kayin) State, Myanmar

As part of an effort supporting Myanmar refugees living in Thailand and internally displaced persons in Myanmar, we aim to develop Lay Kay Kaw village, a region for returnees to Karen (Kayin) State, as a tourist spot. This is being done both to revitalize the regional economy and to further encourage refugees to return home. The project includes the development of tourist infrastructure such as roads, watermills and flower gardens, as well as training for participants in the less tangible aspects of tourism, such as the development of experience-oriented sightseeing programs.

Water, Shelter and Livelihood Support for IDPs in Kachin State

In 2011, the breakdown of a 17-year-old ceasefire agreement between the Myanmar military and Ethnic Armed Organizations (EAOs) resulted in the displacement of over 120,000 residents of Kachin State, including those living in territories controlled by the EAOs. We provided water facilities, housing and vocational training for Kachin’s internally displaced people in support of their livelihood.

Initial Return Project for IDPs in Kachin State

In 2011, the breakdown of a 17-year-old ceasefire agreement between the Myanmar military and Ethnic Armed Organizations (EAOs) resulted in the displacement of over 120,000 residents of Kachin State, including those living in territories controlled by the EAOs. However, there are 8 villages where it has been confirmed to be safe to live. About 3,500 people from 595 households who once fled these villages have expressed the desire to return, and so we are building 595 houses and providing such support as food, education, safety and programs to enable them to generate a stable livelihood.

Providing College Education to Refugees of the Thai Myanmar Border

Due to conflict between the Myanmar military and EAOs following Myanmar’s independence in 1948, there are 9 refugee camps in this border area. It is difficult for youth living in refugee camps to enroll in higher education institutions in Myanmar and Thailand. Unfortunately, once peace has been achieved and these young people return to their homes, they will not have received sufficient education to earn a stable income. Therefore, The Nippon Foundation provides equipment and teacher training at Karenni National College, the only higher education institution serving the camps. We aim to thus provide sufficient opportunities for youth to obtain higher education.

Community Development through School Construction in Shan and Kayah State

498 schools have been built in Shan and Kayah states since 2002. In this project, community members participate in the school construction process and the cost of materials and labor provided by the community are reimbursed in the form of a "Community Development Fund." This fund is increased by income-generating projects such as simple hydroelectric power generation or micro-finance activities, and used for post-construction operation of the schools and community development by the residents.

School Construction Project in Rakhine State

148 schools have been constructed in Rakhine State in the past eight years. The project is being implemented with the objectives of 1) securing a safe and sufficient educational environment for children, 2) providing a place for evacuation in disasters, as well as knowledge of evacuation protocol, 3) creating opportunities to learn construction techniques, for communities in regions where development lags, and 4) reinforcing Parent Teacher Association capacity.

Community Development through School Construction in the Ayeyarwady Region

94 schools have been built since 2013 in the Ayeyarwady Region. When schools are built here, first, one fourth of the school construction cost is collected from villagers. Then, a sturdy school able to withstand flood damage is built. The previous donation by the villagers is then transferred back to the community as seed money for a community-based development project. Such projects include rice field development or student dorms. Revenue from these projects are then used for school management and community development.

Educational Comic Book Project

This project centered on the publication and donation to elementary schools in Myanmar's Ayeyarwady Region of three volumes of educational, biographical comic books. The comic books were about great national figures, and thus provided local children with the opportunity to learn about the heroes and heroines of their country, as well as the history and culture of the times they lived in. Further, through the provision of easily-understood comic-based teaching materials and a biography-themed essay contest, the local children's reading and writing abilities were improved.

Sanitation Facilities for Schools in Shan State

Many schools in Myanmar are inadequately equipped with hand-washing basins, toilets, and other sanitation facilities. At the same time, reports show that in developing countries, the more toilets there are per student, the higher the attendance rates are. This is especially true for adolescent girls.

This project is funded by a bequest from a former Japanese Army soldier who wanted his legacy to be used to improve the sanitation environment in Myanmar, because when he had been stationed there, he had both struggled to secure drinking water and felt that he had made life difficult for the local people. The purpose of the project is to contribute to the improvement of sanitation and the educational environment for children in the region by providing sanitation facilities at schools.

Quality Education for Refugee Children and Host Community Children in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh

Since August 2017, more than 700,000 displaced people have flowed into Cox's Bazar area in Bangladesh, bringing the total number of refugees there to more than 900,000. About 55% are children under the age of 14.

This rapid influx has created an overwhelming shortage of learning facilities, leading to a sharp deterioration of the educational environment, both within the refugee camps and in the surrounding area.

Since January 2020, The Nippon Foundation has worked with BRAC, a local NGO, to 1) build 50 learning centers in the camps, and 2) provide pre-school education programs in 100 locations in host communities surrounding the camps. The aim of this project is to provide educational access for 8,000 children and students in the camps and 3,000 children in the surrounding area.

Education Support for IDPs in Laiza, Kachin State

Laiza, is a base for Kachin State’s Ethnic Armed Organizations (EAOs), and as such the people living there have difficulty obtaining international support. Educational materials and equipment are inadequate for the IDPs in the region. This project provides resources such as tables, chairs and stationery for 15 kindergartens, 4 elementary schools, 3 junior high schools and 1 high school in the IDP camp in Laiza, as well as helping to rebuild a school that was badly in need of repair.

Japan-Myanmar Military Officials Exchange Program

Based on an agreement between The Nippon Foundation and The Myanmar Defense Services, with the cooperation of the Ministry of Defense and Japanese Self-Defense Forces, in December of 2014, 10 generals were invited from Myanmar to Japan, to exchange ideas of what an army should be like in a democratic nation. The activities mainly involve visiting the Ministry of Defense and Self-Defense Force bases and learning about Japan's defense policy and personnel training.

Managing Japanese Language Course in Myanmar

Japanese language instructors of the Shinjuku Japanese Language Institute were dispatched to the Myanmar Defense Services Academy (DSA) to provide a Japanese Language Course, training forty young officers each year. The objective of this project were to promote defense exchange and diplomatic relations between Myanmar and Japan. Officers gained proficiency in Japanese and became able to serve as Japanese language trainers. This enhanced self-management of the Japanese Course by the DSA. Twelve graduating officers have since been dispatched to the Ministry of Defense of Japan, and two officers have been assigned as assistant teachers of the Japanese Course from May 2017. Further, in 2016, one of these two officers served as a Japanese interpreter for the Myanmar Armed Forces in 2016).

Technical Training School in Karen (Kayin) State

Under this project, with the cooperation of the Ministry of Border Affairs' Department of Education and Training, Bridge Asia Japan founded a Technical Training School in Hpa-an, Karen (Kayin) State in 2014 for local young people who have not had the chance to get an education. The school provides four technical training courses in construction, automobile mechanics, electrical work and welding, in an attempt to increase employment opportunities at the individual level, as well as self-management of the Training School.

Vocational Training School in Karen (Kayin) State

With the cooperation of Myanmar's Ministry of Border Affairs, Sustainabridge is running a Technical Training School in Karen (Kayin) State for local young people who have not had enough chances for education.

Further, from 2020 Sustainabridge has been preparing to manage a new training center for conflict-affected youth in Lay Kay Kaw village, a community that has been built as a model village for post-conflict repatriation. The training center itself was built with Japanese government funding.

Training for Officials of the Ministry of Border Affairs

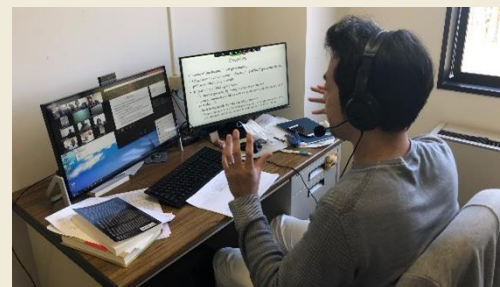
This program provides short-term training for senior and mid-level government officials of the Ministry of Border Affairs, to cultivate the qualities required for administrative officers engaged in local-level administration, with a special focus on the field of education for minorities. Training is held in Yangon and Japan, and online training is available. Topics range from administration and politics to leadership. Training for young staff members, who will be the future of the government, started in 2020, aiming for further improvement of government services.

Training for Officials of the General Administration Department, of All-State/Regional Government

This program provides training for junior staff and middle management in Myanmar's General Administrative Department. Participants receive foundational training through lectures and seminars, learning such skills as the analysis of political issues. The training is conducted in Yangon and Japan, and online training is available. The purposes are: 1. to deepen understanding of democratic administration, 2. to provide public services to citizens, and 3. to enhance administrative capacity and efficiency. In addition, we will conduct special training courses for administrative officials in Rakhine State, focusing on multi-cultural understanding and humanitarian and human rights law.

Promotion of High Quality, Environmentally Friendly Crops and Herbs in Karen (Kayin) State

This project was launched in 2013 in response to a request from the Karen (Kayin) State Government for cooperation in promoting local industries based on the conservation and efficient use of forest resources in the state, with a focus on medicinal herbs. The Karen (Kayin) State Medicinal Plants Resource Center rests on on 40 acres of land provided by the State government. The center cultivates herbs, performs primary processing, and ships these products to Myanmar's domestic herbal medicine manufacturers. It also provides technical guidance on medicinal herb cultivation to farmers, the Department of Agriculture, and the Department of Forestry of Karen (Kayin) State. In the future, the project aims to put more effort into quality control and environmental conservation, branding the center's products with an emphasis on these characteristics. To this end, the project will focus on human resource development, training people who will be responsible for the promotion of the medicinal herb industry and environmental conservation in Karen (Kayin) State.

Myanmar School of Prosthetics and Orthotics

A prosthetist/orthotist training course has been established and operated at University of Medical Technology, Yangon, following standards set by the International Society for Prosthetics and Orthotics in partnership with the WHO. 15 students taken annually. The long-term goal is to train 200 to 300 prosthetist/orthotists. Since 2018, free-prosthetic/orthotic services have been provided in Yangon and Mandalay.

Myanmar National Rehabilitation Hospital PO Clinic

Prosthetic/orthotic services have been provided at the National Rehabilitation Hospital in Yangon, to meet the needs of people there. Government officials and the International Red Cross expanded the service area to Mandalay in 2016. The National Rehabilitation Hospital used to provide PO services to 400 people per year but today that number has increased to 2,200, due to our support. The Nippon Foundation has also supported PO schools in neighboring countries, and graduates from Indonesia and Cambodia have worked here.

Mandalay Orthopedic Hospital PO Clinic

Since 2017, prosthetic/orthotic services have been provided in Mandalay, the second largest city in Myanmar. Hiring graduates of P/O schools in Sri Lanka and Cambodia, the clinic aims to provide services to 1,000 patients per year. Graduates of the PO school in Yangon are hired at the clinic in Mandalay.

Donation of Used Welfare Vehicles

Since 1994, The Nippon Foundation has distributed welfare vehicles in Japan, in order to support the community participation of disabled persons and the elderly. Many of those vehicles that had fulfilled their roles in Japan but were still serviceable were converted into ambulances to reinforce the emergency medical services in Myanmar. Others were not converted but were distributed across Myanmar to be used for public health purposes. A total of 258 vehicles were donated to Myanmar through 2015.

Making PWDs Agents of Change

The purpose of this project is to empower persons with disabilities (PWDs) through training and advocacy activities.

It is estimated that there are 1.3 million PWDs in Myanmar but most of them face discrimination and are economically dependent on others. The Nippon Foundation has been supporting Myanmar Independent Living Initiative (MILI), a non-government organization led by PWDs, to offer management, public relations, and leadership training for PWDs around the country, in order to promote the independent living of PWDs. MILI also organizes workshops for the government officials to advocate for the removal of discriminatory laws and the promotion of rights-based inclusive legislation.

Training School for Traditional Medical Blind Massage

This project provided a training course using a specially made curriculum for visually impaired persons to acquire the medical massage techniques used since ancient times in Myanmar. The training focused on practical skills, but also included lectures concerning anatomical theory and traditional Myanmar medical massage techniques. The objective is the achievement of increased independence and income for visually impaired persons participating the course. The school opened in January 2016 in Mandalay.

Scholarship Project for Students with Disabilities

This was a scholarship program to expand opportunities for university education for persons with disabilities. In collaboration with Myanmar Independent Living Initiative (MILI), a non-government organization led by disabled persons run for persons with disabilities, The Nippon Foundation provided a total of 73 students with scholarships (\$150/month) and regular follow-up counseling.
